Aims of Relationships Education

We aim for all children in our school to develop the understanding, respect and self-confidence to play an active part in school life, be valued and be a valuable member of their communities. We strive to equip children to develop healthy, robust relationships with themselves, others and with God. At Catherington Church of England Infant school we aim to develop children's relationships so that they can lead safe, fulfilling lives and make the world we live in a better place for everyone.

Our school is committed to Relationships Education which:

- Promotes safe, equal, caring and enjoyable relationships and discusses real-life issues
- Gives pupils chance to reflect on values and respect different views
- Seeks pupils' views about relationships so teaching can be made relevant and adapted as their needs change
- Delivers lessons where pupils feel safe and encourages participation by using a variety of teaching opportunities to develop relationship skills
- Is an identifiable part of our PSHE curriculum with planned, timetabled lessons
- Meets the needs of all pupils with their diverse experiences and needs

Curriculum Organisation

Under section 78 of the Education Act 2002 and the Academies Act 2010 a curriculum must:

"promote the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of pupils at the school and of society, and prepare pupils at the school for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life."

Opportunities to learn about caring, respectful and safe relationships at Catherington are part of both the formal and informal curriculum. Promoting positive relationships is embedded throughout the school and has clear links to our Christian values of Love, Respect and Courage.

At Catherington, the content set out in this policy is taught in the context of a broad and balanced curriculum. Class teachers ensure that core knowledge is taught in a carefully sequenced way, within a planned programme of lessons. Teaching includes sufficient well-chosen opportunities and contexts for pupils to embed new knowledge so that it can be used confidently in real life situations.

Our school delivers relationships education as part of a timetabled PSHE programme, supported by the SCARF resource provided by Coram Life Education. The content is closely linked to both the computing and science curriculum and covers the following areas:

- Families and People who care for me
- Caring Friendships
- Respectful Relationships
- Online Relationships
- Being Safe

Families Who Care For Me

Pupils should know:

- That families can give love and security
- That families should protect and care for each other
- That others' families may look different from their own, but should be respected

Caring Friendships

Pupils should know:

- How important friendships are in making us feel happy and secure
- The characteristics of friendships
- That healthy friendships do not make others feel lonely or excluded
- That most friendships have ups and downs that can often be worked through
- How to recognise who to trust and who not to trust; how to seek help or advice from others

Respectful Relationships

Pupils should know:

- The importance of respecting others, even when they are very different from them
- Practical steps they can take to support respectful relationships
- The conventions of courtesy and manners
- The importance of self-respect
- That they can expect to be treated with respect by others
- About different types of bullying, including cyberbullying
- The importance of asking permission and giving in relationships with friends

Online Relationships

Pupils should know:

- That people sometimes behave differently online, including by pretending to be someone they are not
- The importance of respect for others online

The rules for keeping safe online; when and how to ask for help

Being Safe

Pupils should know:

- What sort of boundaries are appropriate in friendships
- About the concept of privacy; including that it is not always right to keep secrets if they relate to being safe
- That each person's body belongs to them, and the differences between appropriate and inappropriate contact
- How to respond safely and appropriately to adults in all contexts, including online
- How to recognise and report feelings of being unsafe or feeling bad about any adult

We also encourage and develop coping strategies and build resilience through the use of an Emotional and Personal Management programme called TRICKBOX. This also provides a simplified cognitive behaviour approach helping children to understand their feelings, do things that make them feel better, look at things differently and build confidence in forming positive relationships.

At Catherington, the Relationships Education curriculum is supported by our Behaviour policy which encourages everyone to show love and kindness to one another, respect by valuing everyone and everything while celebrating difference and courage to do the right thing. We ask the children to follow a set of simple rules which we call the Golden Rules.

The Golden Rules are:

- o We are respectful to others and property
- We are courageous
- We are loving
- We are kind and helpful
- We are honest
- We always try our best

Whilst we deliver relationships education as part of a timetabled PSHE programme, our teaching is flexible and responsive to meet the needs of individuals and cohorts as and when issues arise. Relationships Education is accessible for all pupils, with teaching that is differentiated and personalised to meet the needs of pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND). We also use the Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSA) programme to provide individual support for pupils with social, emotional and mental health needs.

Our curriculum has been created in consultation with staff, parents and pupils to reflect the DfE Statutory Guidance, July 2019 in preparation for the compulsory teaching of Relationships Education in September 2020.

The Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex Education and Health Education (England) Regulations 2019, made under sections 34 and 35 of the Children and Social Work Act 2017, make Relationships Education compulsory for all pupils receiving primary education.

As such, all pupils at Catherington receive Relationships Education as part of our broad and balanced curriculum and parents do not have the option to withdraw their children from lessons. Biological aspects of Relationships Education are taught within the science curriculum, and other aspects are included in Religious Education (RE) and the computing curriculum. Children are taught the correct anatomical names for body parts in an age and developmentally appropriate way. This is part of our Child Safeguarding responsibility and gives children the vocabulary to protect themselves and seek help.

Our Relationships Education curriculum also complies with the relevant requirements of the Equality Act 2010.

This is achieved through pupil conferencing, discussions with staff, governors and parents, considering current legislation and adapting planning to meet the needs of individual pupils and cohorts.

Training

All staff receive regular training from the Lead on new updates and resources for Relationships Education, especially in regards to the new legislation for Compulsory Relationship Education teaching in September 2020.
