What we already know:

Key Vocabulary:

<u>Laws</u>: Rules usually made by the government <u>Racial Segregation</u>: To separate people from each other because of their skin colour.

<u>Race:</u> Describes a group of people who share physical characteristics, such as skin colour.

<u>Protest:</u> An objection to a way of doing things.

Boycott: Stopping doing something because you believe it is not right.

<u>Civil rights</u>: Include the right to free speech, privacy, religion, assembly, a fair trial, and freedom of thought.

<u>Racist</u>: Someone who is negative towards others who are different to them, this could be by skin colour or beliefs.

- Rosa Parks was an African American born in Southern America.
- In the past, laws stopped black and white people being together.
- Rosa Parks refused to give up her seat for a white man on the bus and was arrested and fined.
- Black people stopped using the busses for over a year, to show they were unhappy about the unfair bus laws.

- Rosa Parks is recognised all over the world as a symbol of freedom and equality.
