

Art Knowledge Organiser: Year 1 Summer 1 - Fossil Art

What we already know:

- We can use soft pencils, writing pencils, biros and felt tip pens to draw different textures.
- We can use water paint.
- We can use paintbrushes of different sizes for different purposes.
- We can use hatching and crosshatching to create different tones and shading.

Key Vocabulary:

<u>Pressure:</u> How hard the pencil is pressed on the page to create light and dark shades.

Line: A long narrow mark

<u>Clay</u>: A type of soil that can be moulded when damp and dries hard.

Collage: Sticking paper and other materials onto a surface.

Shading: The darker and lighter parts of a drawing.

<u>Imprint</u>: To impress or stamp on a surface. <u>Sculpt</u>: To create something using shaping techniques.

What we are going to learn:

- To use pasta collage to create a collage
- To use clay to sculpt a fossil
- To draw safely with charcoal
- To use a dry paint brush on a charcoal drawing to create shading.
- To use an Ipad to draw fossils
- To explain that clay can be moulded, shaped and rolled to make other shapes when it is damp.
- To imprint in clay.
